

Christmas Bird Count 2018

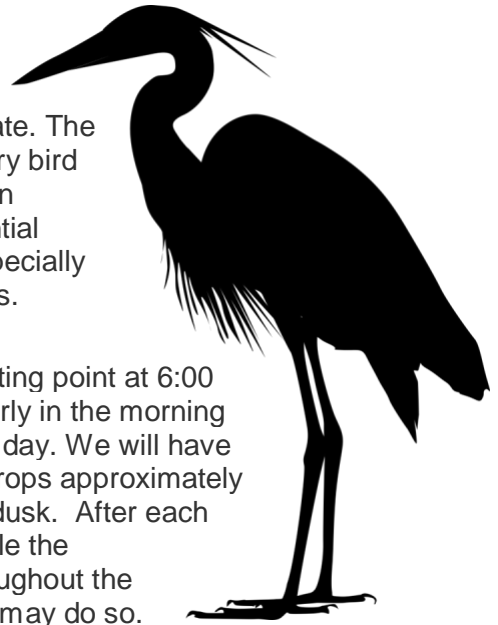

General info

Background: The annual Christmas Bird Count is a citizen science project organized by the National Audubon Society. Birders of all ages and experience levels are welcome to participate. The Christmas Bird Count is an actual census that seeks to count every bird of every species sighted. The collected data can help conservation efforts by tracking the spread of bird populations and noting potential environmental threats that may be impacting the birds. This is especially crucial when counting endemic, threatened, and endangered birds.



Participants will gather at El Refugio or their assigned habitat starting point at 6:00 AM. We can carpool to the habitats. Our bird activity is highest early in the morning and late afternoons. There is minimal activity in the middle of the day. We will have the first half of the bird count from 6:00 AM to when bird activity drops approximately 10:30 AM. The second part of the count will be from 4:00 PM to dusk. After each count, we will gather at El Refugio to report our results and compile the information. Anyone who has the desire to continue counting throughout the day may do so. Anyone who wishes to participate but leave early may do so. Everyone is welcome to participate.

We will have food and drinks at El Refugio during the compiling times.

Christmas Bird Count Tips

- Dress appropriately. Wear light clothes and protect yourself from the sun.
- Bring water and snacks.
- Bring binoculars and field guides if you have them.
- Bring back up pencils or pens for reporting sightings.
- Bring a cell phone for emergencies.
- Hat and sun glasses for sun protection

Habitats:

1. Laguna Potosi and surrounding mangroves (in kayaks)
2. Playa Blanca Beach
3. Ocean and Morros (this will be in a panga with a motor)
4. Sand Dunes, nearby bushy habitat and Cerro Guamilule
5. Salina (Salt Flats surrounding the lagoon)
6. El Refugio and surrounds (includes El Refugio, the Palm Plantations, Mango Groves, Carrizo Lagoon and Loma Bonita). This is a large zone. We expect to have several captains to monitor this area.
7. Los Llanitos Lagoon (Gallinule Pond)
8. Back roads from Los Farrallones to Los Llanitos
